Vehicle-related ASB seizures coming into force via the Crime and Policing Act

The measures remove the requirement for police officers to give a warning before seizing a motor vehicle used in an antisocial manner. There is also a change in the law to shorten the time between vehicles being seized by the police, and when they can be disposed of. You can read more about this [here](#).

Empty properties can become vulnerable to antisocial behaviour, vandalism and unauthorised access, creating concern for residents. However, it is set up so it **should** default to the settings on your device. I've added some basic instructions on how to adjust your devices below, I hope it helps.

Phone or Tablet

iPhone or iPad

- Open **Settings**.
- Tap **Display & Brightness**.
- Select **Text Size**.
- Move the slider to increase or decrease the text size.

Android phone or tablet

- Open **Settings**.
- Tap **Accessibility**.
- Select **Display size and text** (the wording may vary depending on your device).
- Adjust the text size using the available options.

Desktop or Laptop Computer

Windows computer

- Open the **Start** menu and select **Settings**.
- Choose **Accessibility**.
- Select **Text size**.
- Move the **Text size** slider to the right to make text larger.
- Click **Apply** to save your changes.

Mac (Apple) computer

- Open the **Apple menu** and select **System Settings** (or **System Preferences** on older versions of macOS).
- Select **Accessibility**.
- Choose **Display**.
- Adjust the **Text size** setting to make text larger.
